

WINTER 2020 MAP RESULTS

Winter MAP data showed that District 181 is not experiencing the COVID achievement gap that other Districts may be experiencing.

Additionally, D181 noted an increase in the percentage of students meeting/exceeding the 69th percentile. The goal of the 69th percentile was identified as this achievement level has a strong correlation with proficiency on our state assessment, the Illinois Assessment of Readiness.



D181 NEIGHBORHOOD PRESCHOOL

The District 181 Neighborhood Preschool Program provides opportunities for children to achieve their personal best in a safe, productive, and nurturing classroom community. The Neighborhood Preschool believes all children can learn and grow with research-based, developmentally appropriate materials and practices and partnership with families, the community, and stakeholders.











Any resident of District 181 can attend The Neighborhood Preschool. Children need to be 3 years of age by September 1 of the school year they wish to enroll.

COVID-19 AND OUR SCHOOLS

START OF THE SCHOOL YEAR

On September 8, 2020, District 181 students and staff returned to all D181 buildings for inperson learning for the first time since the COVID-19 closures in March 2020. The District implemented a hybrid/remote learning model. Under the hybrid model, students were offered the opportunity to attend a half-day of in-person learning with an accompanying half-day of asynchronous learning. A full remote learning option was offered to all families who preferred it.

HYBRID/REMOTE MODEL

Our Hybrid/Remote Model proved to be a safe and academically successful period for our students. Students remained in school without interruption in this model Sept. 8, 2020, through April 5, 2021, when the District began offering a full in-person/remote model.

FULL IN-PERSON/REMOTE MODEL

On April 5, 2021, 3,275 students (nearly 90%) returned to all D181 buildings for full-day, in-person learning. A remote learning option was available to families who preferred it. This learning model continued, uninterrupted by closures or outbreaks, through the end of the school year. This continuity was possible due to our administrative team's incredible planning efforts, and our staff, students, and community's diligence in following the recommended safety protocols.

COVID-19 SUPPORT

SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS & STAFF

The social-emotional needs of our students continued to be a priority during COVID-19. Students were given special attention during this time due to the unique school and social environments. Some examples of supports offered were Bitmoji Calming Rooms for students to check in with their feelings and meet with a social worker virtually. Schools also offered virtual Covid resource rooms that provided child-friendly safety information and coping strategies.

Professional development opportunities were offered to staff on topics including staying connected while social distancing, work fatigue, and balancing anxiety with keeping a positive attitude.

PARENT AND STAFF RESOURCES

A webpage on the D181 website was created to provide health and safety resources, COVID reporting, and learning model information for families and staff. Special videos, a data dashboard, and parent and staff guidebooks were also provided.

Weekly email updates were sent from the District Office to help navigate new information and celebrate staff and student accomplishments.



COVID-19 STAFF VACCINE CLINIC




The first dose of the Moderna Covid-19 vaccine was administered to D181 staff who signed up in early February and the second dose was administered in early March.

D181 PARTNERS WITH D86 AND FEEDER SCHOOLS FOR VACCINE CLINIC

District 181, in collaboration with District 86 and its other feeder schools, partnered with Osco for a Covid-19 vaccine clinic open to all teachers and staff. Vaccines were administered at Hinsdale South and Hinsdale Central high schools.

More than 80% of District 181 staff signed up for an appointment to receive the vaccine through the District. The remaining percentage includes people who had already received the vaccine, were receiving the vaccine through other means, or were undecided about receiving the vaccine at the time.



Students received materials for the project at school then logged into a Zoom session led by an experienced DCM educator. Each lesson involves building, making, experimenting, or engineering a solution to a problem and are completed independently by students. When Srinidhi Rao was just 2 years old, she was walking to her father's doctor's office and spelled a word she saw on the wall. "C-a-r-d-i-o-l-o-g-y." It was the beginning of a lifelong love of spelling.

Srinidhi, a fifth-grader at The Lane School, qualified to compete in the 2021 Scripps National Spelling Bee, one of her many spelling accomplishments but the most prestigious to date.

"I love learning words in new languages and doing stems to understand words better," Srinidhi said. "I feel so good when I have spelled a difficult new word correctly by deciphering it from the word roots and language patterns."

Srinidhi's mother, Leelaa Rao, said people are always amazed when they see her daughter's talent and learn her age.

"I am very thankful that one of her teachers took special interest in her in kindergarten," Leelaa said. "We have nurtured her love for spelling since then while making sure she isn't just a spelling machine. We want her to understand the definitions as she learns and understands more about how language works."

Srinidhi studies every day after school and after finishing her homework and about 5-6 hours on weekends. She also has a strong interest in music and performs in classical music concerts with her grandmother and mother. Her dream career is to follow in her father's footsteps, Dr. Rammohan Rao — she wants to be a pulmonary critical care doctor.

At the Scripps Spelling Bee, Srinidhi finished in 111th place (tied). Congratulations Srinidhi!




MIDDLE SCHOOLS HONOR WORLD WAR II THROUGH INTERACTIVE EXPERIENCES

Hinsdale Middle School eighth-graders had a special World War II learning experience this year in their "World War II Community Museum." HMS teacher Rick Dusek worked with HMS parent and PTO member Stephanie Konieczka to reimagine what WWII Day might look like since the school was unable to host veteran speakers as in years past due to COVID-19 safety guidelines.

HMS families were invited to share photos, artifacts, and/or stories that were curated into the museum. Cantigny Museum and the Hinsdale Historical Society also contributed artifacts.



As students entered the museum, they were given an identity card with the name, photograph, address, and birthdate of a Hinsdale WWII veteran. At the end of the museum, students found their veterans on the Wall of Remembrance and read about their lives and service. Much of this information came from biographies and obituaries provided by the Hinsdale Historical Society. A "theater" was also set up, where they saw a documentary of Holocaust Survivor Magda Brown. Ms. Brown had spoken to D181 8th graders for more than 15 years on previous WWII days and passed away last summer.





Clarendon Hills Middle School recreated their WWII Day by hosting individual projects in classrooms.

One of the unique projects was created by CHMS 8th grader Juliana Waters, who studied the Engima Machine. The Enigma Machine helped break Hitler's complex war codes, and Juliana taught her fellow classmates about the process by making her own enigma machine and asking students to decode a message.

8th grader Evan Mehta also gave his project a special twist as he researched the question, "How did the Japanese attack Pearl Harbor undetected in World War II?" His presentation was a recreation of the battle of Pearl Harbor using a 3D model.

The drive is in partnership with the Hinsdale, Clarendon Hills, and Burr Ridge Police Departments.





















































































D181 BOARD OF EDUCATION
